Ray Judah, on right in photo, who served as Lee County Commissioner from 1988 - 2012 was the advocate for Lee Voter Freedom, supporters of changing to the non-partisan process.

Dr. Peter Bergerson, on left, Professor of Political Science and Public Administration at FGCU was the adversary.



The present partisan process means that unless you are registered with one of the two major political parties, you many not get a say in who your next commissioner will be in Lee County.

Jon McLeod acted as moderator and **Vince Modarel**li was the time-keeper. The audience was invited to submit written questions during the session.

Ray Judah proclaimed he wanted the process to be "Fair to all concerned." He says the Citizen United decision has had a tremendous impact on "what we used to think was a two party system. Super PAC spending has skewed the entire political process..elections are becoming more of an auction than a campaign.

Ray noted that the six cities in the county elect their officials on a non-partisan basis. The existing law allows a "write-in" candidate to effectively close the primary to other party and independent registrants. "When this happens, the candidate is selecting the voters, rather than the voter selecting the candidate."

Ray noted that in 2016 a large fraction of the under 40 year old voters were independents and thus not able to participate in partisan elections.

He noted that the Lee Voter Freedom campaign needs 30,000 petition signatures in the next four months to get the referendum on the ballot for November 2018. Dr. Bergerson says that in states with open primaries, "voter turn-out is desperately low." He notes that a "non-partisan election does not mean no politics, just a different form of politics. Oftentimes less transparent."

He says that the lack of party endorsement of candidates may reduce the public scrutiny and gives a distinct advantage to the incumbent over challengers because name recognition becomes the important factor in candidate selection.

Dr. Bergerson says the greatest predictor of why and how people vote is their identification of being either Republican of Democrat. "When you take away the party, [it] reduces the incentive for people to vote."

He noted that only 29% of the registered voters participated in the 2016 Primary Election. There were several local state and national office contests on the Republican ballot. Republican turn-out was 42%. There was only one contest on the Democratic ballot, US Senator. Turnout was 25%. Other (independent) voter turnout was 12%.

Ray Judah said no one should feel threatened by the open (non-partisan) process. "It's about everyone having the right to vote and shouldn't be special interests hand picking a candidate."

Dr. Bergerson says that from the party's perspective the issue is, "who should control the original candidate selection process. Historically, the job of the parties. [Non partisan] elections will dilute the strength of the parties and the accountability of the party to its members."
