A Day to Remember

The Terror, Tragedy, and Humanity of 9/11



Last week the Reverend Dr. Clinton C. Cottrell offered a chilling, engaging, and profound recollection and reflection on the events and horror that was and continues to be 9/11.

Reverend Cottrell currently serves as the pastor of Cypress Lake Presbyterian Church in South Fort Myers. Prior to being ordained as a minister, he served for over two decades as an air traffic controller, tower manager and on the executive staff of the Federal Aviation Administration.

In that capacity, he offered a riveting recollection of 9/11, offering new insights and information regarding that horrific day. We learned of the professionalism and proficiency of our air traffic control system, as it safely managed and landed domestic air traffic consisting of almost 7000 planes during that emergency and the heroism of a C-130 crew who decided to defend their nation's capital.

Reverend Cottrell concluded his remarks by noting, "in the midst of the evil...there are good people who do remarkable things." We honor their efforts and memory--thanks Reverend Cottrell for that insight and a most thought-provoking presentation.

Sustainable Water in India

RI also reports that a Rotarian-led team of hydrologists, engineers, geologists, and other experts traveled to the Thane district of northwest India in October to help local Rotarians and their international partners design a global grant project to bring clean water and sanitation to more than 1,800 villagers.

The team, funded by The Rotary Foundation and a grant from the Annenberg Foundation, is one of the first of its kind. It's the product of the Project Enhancement Process (PEP) pilot, which

is designed to enlist the help of Rotarians with expertise in the water and sanitation area of focus so that clubs and districts can put together largerscale, sustainable projects.

After deciding to pursue a water project in the Akre Gram Panchayat



region of India, the Rotary Club of Thane North and its international partner, the Tacoma club, requested an evaluation team through the PEP Pilot to help them assess and plan their project. The project would benefit about 350 households in nine villages in the Supi River watershed, where villagers are trying to eke out a living growing rice.
