In Support of Polio Plus


The appearance of the "big check" in our meeting room is always a welcoming sign, serving as a tangible symbol of our Club's continuing and e n d u r i n g generosity to all

This past Wednesday was a special day for our Club as we celebrated and held our "Greatest Meal." We were honored by the presence of PDG and District Rotary Foundation Chair Steve Schlueter who offered an engaging, informative, and interactive presentation on the tradition and history of giving within Rotary and the important work of our Foundation. But the morning was really about "connection," offering a number of examples of the way in which we as Rotarians are linked to each other by history, tradition, purpose, and mission. As usual, our generosity was remarkable. **President Sandy** later reported that \$3175 was raised from both our members and Club Foundation. RI Reports: World Polio Day

After a year of shrinking polio cases worldwide, the crippling disease is now on the cusp of being eradicated, said top health officials at Rotary's second annual World Polio Day event on October 24. At a special Livestream Program — World Polio Day: Make History Today — Rotary leaders joined global health experts and celebrity singers to hail the progress of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

The total number of global cases to date is 247, compared with 298 for the same period last year. Outside Pakistan, which saw its polio cases spike this year, to

Outside Pakistan, which saw its polio cases spike this year, the number of cases has been 35, a dramatic decrease from 187 a year ago.

The GPEI is on the verge of a major polio achievement in Nigeria. The country has registered only six cases to date this year. "Nigeria is in excellent position to stop circulation of



polio this year," said Tom Frieden, CDC Director. "It has gotten 'this close' to eradicating polio by a remarkable turnaround of the program, implementing an emergency operations center, developing a proactive approach to eradication, finding innovative ways to reach children in insecure areas."

Frieden talked about how Nigeria's Polio Emergency Operations Center aided in the quick and effective response to the country's Ebola outbreak. Senior

officials from the center were sent to Lagos to lead the effort. They opened an Ebola treatment unit and conducted contact tracing with up to 500 people per day. "In spite of these efforts, polio activities did not suffer," said Frieden. "This is the legacy of polio eradication in action, and it saved lives by successfully stopping the outbreak."
