Tracy Maurer is a Special Agent with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement from the Ft. Myers Regional Operations Center. Tracy has been with the department for 8 years, specializes in economic crime, is a certified fraud examiner, and is coordinator of the Child Abduction Response Team (CART) for this area.

Statistics show time is crucial in abduction cases. CART is an interagency approach to share financial and personnel resources, access specialized equipment and expertise, and assure the community that all available resources are committed to a successful rescue.

DJ Beddow is director of SWFL K9 Search Unit, an agency included in the CART team. Tracy read the citation given to SWFL K9 for the work done by bloodhound Gracie Bell in recovering a missing 2 year old in Immokalee.

DJ says her group is a non-profit organization that consists of highly trained volunteer search personnel. K-9's are trained in a wide variety of disciplines for search needs. She said her bloodhound was having heart problems that weren't solved until she brought the dog to **Wendy Arsenault** who was able to save Gracie Bell.



Bobbi presented **Frank Liles** with his permanent, blue name badge in recognition of his completing all the "red" badge tasks.



In Memoriam George H. Spear

FOUNDATION GRANTS AT WORK

"We saw many changes in the kids, in the teachers, and in the community," says Jorge Aufranc, past governor of District 4250 and a member of the Rotary Club of Guatemala Sur. "They appreciate the work that Rotary has done."



A Rotary Foundation global grant implemented by the Guatemala Sur club provided the school with computers and a machine called a mechanical cow, which produces soy milk. The device is made of stainless steel and does not look much like a cow.

Soybeans are put into a funnel at the top, and about 45 minutes later, they have been turned into soy milk and a pulp called okara, which is used in the school's cooking classes. On one recent day, the girls were using Pasos, the Guatemala Sur club the okara to make cookies.

Aufranc's district has used the Rotary Foundation's 6420 and 6440 (Illinois, USA), as new grants to help many schools in the area. It took part in the three-year pilot of the new grant system, during which 43 global grants have been undertaken in the district, including five by the Guatemala Sur club. The pilot ends I July, and the new grants then become the grant successful. available to all districts.

The Guatemala Sur club began with projects that address needs they deemed critical. For example, one global grant is providing nine rural schools in Sumpango with washing stations, latrines, kitchen equipment, and furniture.

"Everything begins with water," Aufranc says. "If there is no water, we cannot have peace. Where there is a lack of water, there is conflict."


