Chris Riesen introduced our speaker Brent Barkway, Business Development Manager at Lee County Economic Development Office. His main focus is working with companies from outside of Florida. These deals must be developed without revealing company names.

Most recently he was project manager for the relocation of Hertz from NJ and Oklahoma offices to Estero. He notes that one

big question for potential transferees is the opportunity for spousal employment.

Brent praised the helful work of the Community Development Department in dealing with the company long before they knew the company was Hertz.

In addition, the Economic Development Office has a close relationship with both Edison State College and FGCU. The schools are very willing to develop programs for a company that has a large number of employees needing training in a particular area.

The Hertz announcement has resulted in the area now being viewed as a possible business location not just a tourist place. Brent said there is now a focus on trying to develop the area near the airport. He said, "We have a number of companies looking, but haven't snagged one yet."

Of course, this was just another example of secret keeping. The **next day** it was announced that Alta Resources would be taking over space in Gateway near the airport bringing 400 new jobs.


