Harry Chapin was a popular folk/rock music performer who donated proceeds from every other concert to ending hunger. He died in a car accident in 1981 at the age of 39. Harry's widow gave permission for his name to be used by the food bank which serves the 5 counties of SWFL. The Harry Chapin Food Bank of SWFL recovers, inspects, transports, and distributes donated food and other grocery products to more than 150 partner agencies that serve Southwest Floridians in need. The HCFB also distributes food to underserved areas and targeted populations using a mobile pantry program.

In 2013, HCFB distributed **17.5 million pounds** of food valued at **\$29.6 million**. **Each month** the food bank will help serve at least **30,000 children, seniors, and other Southwest Floridians** facing hunger. 40% of the clients served are children and 10% are seniors.

Volunteers make the HCFB work. These are people who want to make a difference by helping feed their neighbors in need. In 2013 more than 2,750 people volunteered 43,000 hours of service worth almost \$1 million.

Each **donated \$1** is turned into \$6 in food value. 97% of each donated dollar goes to programs.

Derry New Hampshire's two Rotary clubs have **joined together for the last six years** to sponsor a cookout honoring all Derry area veterans. The annual veterans salute began as a way to honor veterans for their service.

"Our vets are so important to what we have today," Rotarian and Derry police Chief Edward Garone said. "We didn't feel they were getting the proper recognition."

The two Derry Rotary clubs made it possible that first year for 20 World War II veterans living in Derry to take a free trip to visit

The following year, the clubs hosted a catered dinner for Korean War veterans. Subsequent years honored veterans from the Vietnam War, then all veterans from all wars were invited to center stage.

This year's event is to celebrate veterans from all wars and conflicts. Younger veterans are also invited to the cookout.

Veterans attending this year's barbecue had a lot of stories to tell and many memories to share. They are buddies, comrades and longtime friends. It was mostly about friendship.

Vietnam Air Force veteran Rod Pierce served from 1960 to 1965. "I think it's important to recognize the people that

served their country," he said. "I came home, but a lot didn't."

Gold Star mother Karen Vaughn came to the dinner and shared her thoughts about veterans and their service. Her son, Navy

SEAL Vaughn, was killed 2011 while serving Afghanistan. She she said honored to be in the room. "This room represents some of the greatest gifts to this nation," she said. "There is place Earth I'd rather be."

Vaughn said she knew that many in attendance may have witnessed

friends take their last breath on a battlefield.

Lois Newcomb, 98, still remembers vividly joining the Navy and serving during World War II, working at a naval hospital in California. "I would see the men when they could come back," she said. Newcomb said she was very young when she enlisted, but never thought twice about the importance of what she was doing. "I really enjoyed it," she said.

Don Belinsky shared a special poem he wrote for a fallen friend. He read his words before the veterans in the room and said he would never forget his buddy, Timothy Call. The Air Force veteran served from 1967 to 1971. He said he wouldn't be standing today if it weren't for all the veterans.
