He is a veteran of the US Air Force and enjoyed a career in the information systems industry as a designer, manager and executive until he and his wife Linda retired to Fort Myers in 1997.



President Jim announced a new Club initiative this year. Reminding us that Rotary began as a networking organization, **President Jim** announced the institution of a "Member Spotlight," allowing




