Safari Your Way

Our speaker was **Simon Gluckman**, founder of Intrepid Expeditions, a company specializing in custom photographic safaris to Africa. The company's motto is **Safari Your Way**.

Simon was born in South Africa and raised in the States. His passion for Africa developed as a child, spending summers with relatives touring South Africa's national parks and the famed Garden Route.

After college, he took a 6-month, overland trip through five Southern African countries, inspiring his career to help others experience this mystic continent.

In nearly 20 years of organizing custom safaris, he has made multiple visits to nearly every country in East and Southern Africa, as well as Egypt, Ethiopia and numerous Indian Ocean islands. In 2009, he began offering safaris and opportunities to get more involved in wild life and conservation.

Simon discussed some disturbing developments in the important national parks in East and South Africa. Elephant herds are smaller and hard to find, the black rhino population is barely large enough to sustain the species, and gorilla groups are being attacked.

There was an **increase in poaching** as the rhino horn trade exploded in 2007. Over 90% of the Black Rhino population has been killed since 1970, less than 2,300 left today. The

growing middle class in China and Vietnam is the main driving force behind the demand for rhino horn and ivory.

Increasing demand for tungsten, tin, gold, copper, tantalum used in **mobile phones and other electronic devices** has resulted in increased mining activity. This has brought about new roads, railroads and other human activity cutting across the historic migration paths of the animals.

Rhino, elephant and lion are a cause for serious concern as numbers are plummeting as people go after them mostly for money. But of much greater concern is the bush meat trade.

Often overlooked because of the glamour and media attention that large game species get, thousands of smaller animals from giraffe and buffalo to antelope are getting carted away on horseback, in canoes and sometimes in pick-up trucks for sale to villages across this continent. The effect on overall populations is getting catastrophic.

Simon believes:

- Wildlife can be saved
- Land can be preserved
- Communities can be empowered

He asks us to:

Today's Speaker

Today's speaker is **Steve Pino**, President of The Florida Suncoast Chapter of the **Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation** (JDRF). The JDRF was formed in 1994 by grandparents Phyllis and Sol Steingard who have a grand-daughter, Britni, with type I diabetes (TID). **Type I diabetes** (**TID**) is an autoimmune dis-

ease in which a person's pancreas stops producing insulin, a hormone that enables people to get energy from food. The families shared a common goal to find a cure for diabetes and its complications, as well as a common need for education, support services, and enhanced medical care for diabetics in the community.
