

Wikipedia says: "Prohibition in the United States was a nationwide constitutional ban on the sale, production, importation, and transportation of alcoholic beverages that remained in place from 1920 to 1933.

"It was promoted by the 'dry' crusaders, a movement led by rural Protestants and social Progressives in the Democratic and Republican parties, and was coordinated by the Anti-

Saloon League, and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. Prohibition was mandated under the 18th Amendment to the Constitution.

"Nationwide, Prohibition ended with the ratification of the 21st Amendment which repealed the 18th Amendment, on December 5, 1933."

For most of us, our understanding of Prohibition comes from our parent's tales, TV, and movies.

The Untouchables was an American TV crime drama that ran from 1959 to 1963 based on the book by Eliot Ness and Oscar Fraly. It fictionalized Ness' experiences as a Prohibition Agent, fighting crime in Chicago in the 1930s with the help of a special team of agents nicknamed the Untouchables. The book was later made into a film in 1987.

The series originally focused on the efforts of a real-life squad of Prohibition agents employed by the U.S. Department of the Treasury and led by Eliot Ness, that helped bring down the bootleg empire of "Scarface" Al Capone, as described in Ness's bestselling 1957 memoir.

Our speaker, **Deidre Capone**, author of "Uncle Al Capone" told us of the difficulties

of growing up as a Capone family member. Her father, Al Capone's brother, had registered her in school using his middle name. However, the secret came out in the newspapers when she was in second grade. After that she was shunned in her catholic school, without friends or invitations.

She told of keeping her family lineage from her own children until they began to study about the period in History classes. After she sat them down to hear the story, she was relieved when the all said "Cool" after she had revealed her family background.

Deidre told us of the kindnesses the brothers did for people who were down and out during the Great Depression and the fond memories she has of visiting Al's Florida mansion with a salt water swimming pool.
