Rebeca died Saturday, Sept. 5, 2015 in Monterrey, Mexico. She was born in 1992, in Campeche, Mexico where she was raised.

She enrolled at FGCU in 2010 as an international student on the Latin American and the Caribbean Scholarship and graduated in May 2015 with a bachelor's in environmental engineering.

She was pursuing a master's degree in Monterrey when she died when a fire in her home caused by a gas leak.

Rebeca was not an ordinary FGCU student. She was highly involved and left a significant impact on the university. Among her abundant involvement, she was a resident assistant, orientation leader, employee in the Multicultural and Development Office, teaching assistant in the U.A. Whitaker College of Engineering, member of the Rotary Club and a member of the Lead Team. She was also a founding member of Phi Mu and a part of the Order of Omega in her senior year.

Her brother Paul, now an FGCU senior, is working to establish a scholarship fund in Rebeca's name. Sept. 5 marked the first year since Rebeca's death.

The idea for the scholarship came from a friend in the Office of International Services. Paul agreed with the idea, knowing that Rebeca would love it.

Paul Olivera, the family's youngest, is a junior computer information systems major. "Many years ago, she started acting like a mother to me, and whenever she introduced me to her friends, she said, 'This is my son,'" Paul Olivera said.

He said Rebeca dreamed of changing Mexico someday. "She always complained about water pollution," Paul Olivera said. "Her dream was to come back home and try to fix it."

A GoFundMe page has been created in honor of former Eagle Rebeca Olivera by brother Paul Olivera to establish an endowed memorial scholarship at FGCU.

Marjorie testified that M.E. is a "computer guru" and web site designer. Photography is her passion. She continues her fusion of art and nature by exploring Florida with a camera.

M. E. says that Florida is one the most colorful and naturally unique environments on Earth. "I find treasures beyond measure, good light, willing birds, dramatic skies, and the solitude of wild places."

She described on of her favorite spots, off the beaten track, Fisheating Creek in Glades County. This is the last natural tributary of Lake Okeechobee. "It is one of the last beautiful natural places with public access." She showed us the bald cypress, butterflies and gators there.

Another favorite is the Big Cypress Preserve in Collier County. This area of 729,000 acres was acquired by the National Parks System in 1974 to preserve the water flow to Everglades National Park. Edison, Ford, and Firestone began using the area as a camping destination as early as 1914. Ford offered to buy the land and donate it to the state in 1922, but was turned

down because "it would cost too much to maintain."

M.E. described the Preserve as a "magical place especially in summer with the sunset over the swamp after wonderful day of storms."


M.E. explained she has a few perspectives that she likes to live by:


"Travel in good company."
