Last Week Speaker



Chuck Spears introduced our speaker, club member, **Heber Paulin**. Heber has been in banking for 25 years. He is now a regional manager of 64 branches.

Heber was born in Cuba in 1966, left with his family at age 14 and spent a year in Jamaica before coming to the U.S. Because of his accented English. he describes himself as the Ricky Ricardo of banking.

Heber described the hardships of growing up in Communist Cuba. "You don't have a childhood in Cuba. We heard our parents as they struggled to get through every day." Heber is a "Preacher's Kid" and is a practicing Sabbath Keeper. His beliefs are that the Sabbath should be observed from Friday sunset to Saturday sunset and that no work should be done on the Sabbath.

When he went to elementary school, he would not wear the Pioneros banner. This was a banner that stated "I believe in Communism". Since communists are not supposed to believe in God, he refused to wear the banner which was against his core beliefs.

Every couple of months as a 7 and 8 year old, he would be sent to the principal's office to meet with the head of the Communist Party of the city to argue the points of view of "Why did I believe in God?" He didn't back down, and on one occasion his arguments stymied the communist who told him, "Get the hell out of this office."

In the higher grades, classes were held on Saturday. Heber's religious beliefs did not allow him to attend. This infuriated the principal who wanted to flunk him. Somehow, he managed to do well enough to offset the zeros on Saturday. This was, "A higher power working in my favor." At that time in Cuba, there was compulsory military service for three years beginning at age 15. His older brother was in the service and was jailed because he refused to work on the sabbath. Just before Heber's 15th birthday the family moved to Jamaica. There they lived with many families crowded into houses while they worked to get to the U.S.

Heber told us of a story by a long time political prisoner of a teen ager who refused to work on the sabbath, was jailed, tortured, and never seen again. "I am proud of the land I live in today. I have lived here longer than I lived in Cuba. I became and American citizen the minute I was able.

"We don't know the freedom we have. We don't have a clue of the liberties we enjoy each and every day; the facilities we have; the ability to get whatever you want."

In Cuba today, toilet paper is an unknown luxury. Food is rationed and many are hungry. Heber says, "Cuba is a very fertile country. How come our people are starving with no rice, no beans? The excuse is 'The Embargo'. It's a joke folks. The embargo is doing nothing. Cuba can get anything from anywhere else in the world.

"Where does the embargo say farmers can not grow rice and sell it to the people of Cuba? Cuban farmers can not sell beans to their own people. Your [Cuban] president is giving you the embargo. "He does that so you get up every morning trying to figure out how to feed your family so you don't have time to think about how to get this guy out of power.

"Fidel was smart but evil. For the first three years he never said anything about being a communist. But he was preparing the secret police, the suppression police secretly. We didn't know if the neighbors were watching and reporting. People were scared to do anything.

"When I wanted to join the Marines, my mother begged me not to. In honor of the commandment to honor thy parents, I didn't go. If I could do one thing over again, it would be to serve this great nation as a token of gratitude for what it has done for me and my family."

Heber is planning a trip to visit his wife's ailing grandmother and aunt. He will be preaching at a small rural church and is going to give a gift bag of soap, cooking oil, rice, etc. to the congregants. If you would like to contribute contact Heber.

After listening to this presentation, Jim Horein said, "I have one more reason to be proud to be a Rotarian, that's you."
