Tom Briers reported on efforts by him and son, Mike, that raised over \$28,000 for flood relief for victims in their home state of West Virginia.

Growing Up in Bonita



Roger Brunswick introduced the program, Growing up in Bonita". This was an informal, unrehearsed discussion with Don Thomson, Gary Murphy, and Frank Liles telling stories and commenting on photos.

Frank was born in Bonita. His mother's family was involved in lumbering and his father's in fruit growing. "There are no really tall, straight pine trees in Bonita Springs. My grandfather and his buddies cut down every good tree in SWFL."

Gary grew up and went to school in Miami. He came to Bonita every Friday with his family and spent the weekend fishing and hunting. He recalled wading to the camp after Hurricane Donna (1960) to find the refrigerator floating in the kitchen.

Don's parents moved to Naples in 1968. By 1970, they decided Naples was growing too fast so they moved to Bonita Beach where the family ran a motel, marina, and restaurant. When his dad needed a shrimp tank, he used a casket vault which later was used by Gary Murphy.

Gary says the river has changed a bit. There used to be big, big fish come up the Imperial River. They used to put out fishing lines at night tied to bicycle tubes anchored to cabbage palms. They often caught big catfish and jewfish. One morning they had a 14' saw fish on the line.

Frank said, "There wasn't a lot to do growing up here. Old 41 was about the the only paved road. At night, the kids would swim from the old railroad trestle. There were no locked doors in town. The first school bus took 38 kids from Bonita to Fort Myers High."

In the 60's and 70's there were only two roads, Old 41 and Bonita Beach Rd, to get in and out of Bonita. The the dog track was the entertainment place of SWFL so there was a monumental traffic jam at the beginning and end of the races.

Don had a brochure from the family business advertising beer on tap for .45 and bayside 2 bedroom, 1 bath units for \$80/week or \$13/day.

Frank said, "When people complain about the traffic in season, I tell them that when I was growing up in Bonita and you wanted anything for the car, house, or doctor you had to go to Naples or Fort Myers. There was just nothin' here at all. And now I'm glad all these people came here because I can go out my front door and get anything in about 15 minutes."
