Our Program Last Week Judy Walker & Alejandra Vega

December Program Chair Steve Akers introduced Judy Walker and Alejandra Vega to us. Judy is a lifelong educator who is now serving as a volunteer with the Bonita Springs Literary Council. Judy told us that although here career as a professional educator was always very rewarding, it does not compare to the feeling she has serving in the Literacy Council as a tutor. Included in her service is a class she teaches on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12:30 to 2:30 for reading, writing, and speaking English. The Council provides books to mothers that they can take home to read to their children. Judy told us that "when you educate a mother, you educate the whole family." Alejandra Vega, an 11th grade student at South Fort Myers H.S. told us about her trip to Washington D.C. on the National Youth Leadership Program in which she studied U.S. history, international relations, foreign policy making, including visits to Congress and many of our nation's monuments and government buildings. During one of the programs she played Assistant Secretary of State for the Bureau of African Affairs and announced her group's proposed policies. After this incredible one week experience, Alejandra told us that she is now interested in world affairs and is watching what is going on in the world with a new interest she never had before attending this National Youth Leadership Program.

Shots For Tots

Ira Hawk gave us a comprehensive update on the Shots for Tots program. The program, now in it's 12th year, has served 4905 children and has administered 10013 immunizations. The overall program, which includes the First Presbyterian Church's other program with Lee County, has now administered shots to over 10,000 children. In addition to the Tuesday evening clinic, the Health Department also offers shots at the First Presbyterian Church on the Second Thursday morning of each week. In 2000 this clinic gave 237 shots to 117 children. In 2001 the morning clinic gave 331 shots to 156 children. In 2002, 169 children received 330 shots. In 2003, it game 563 shots to 240 children. In 2004, 299 shots were given to 134 children. In 2005, 447 shots were given to 185 children. Thus, the six year totals for the Thursday morning clinic are 2207 shots to 1001 children. Great Work Ira on this excellent program!

Among the programs for interim help are the Soup Kitchen, Clothing and Showers, Back to School Shoes, Thanksgiving in the Park, and The Christmas Toy Shop.

The children of these families make up the largest migrant population, over 7,200, of any school district east of the Mississippi. Joane Pierre, an Immokalee High School student, is a tutor at the "Guadalupe After School Program". She described the satisfaction she gets from this work and her hopes to go to Princeton University and to become a lawyer and fashion designer.

The center also has programs for adults in ESOL where as many as 400 adults may participate in a year, and a VESOL program to train participants in basic trades. Other programs are offered in computers and language training software using the facilities at Bethune Education Center in Immokalee.

Hundreds of Immokalee families live without adequate plumbing or kitchens. Many have no telephone or car. Only twenty percent have a high school education. One of the few places to welcome them is the Guadalupe Center. Here they receive a helping hand with no questions asked and minimal or no fees charged.

Maiorie Rubacky introduced quest speaker, Samira Beckwith, president and CEO of Hope of Southwest Florida. Hope Hospice is a not-for-profit organization that cares for people at end-of-life serving about 800 people and their families each day in Lee, Hendry, and Glades counties. Anyone can make a referral for hospice

care. The staff will then follow up with the individual's personal physician to make sure they are appropriate for hospice care. Hospice care is provided when the person's prognosis is six months or less, depending on the course of the disease. The goal of hospice care is to provide the patient with comfort when they cannot be cured.

Over 90% of the services are provided in the patient's home and include visits by nurses, physicians, aides, social workers, chaplains, volunteers, and therapies such as music, art, and massage. When patients are no longer able to remain in their home, they are cared for with hospice services, in Hope's hospice houses, Shell Point Community, nursing homes, assisted living facilities and hospitals. Services are covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and private insurance coverage. No person is ever turned away for lack of insurance coverage.

The newest addition was the opening of Joanne's House in Bonita Springs. This 24-bed hospice house provides inpatient hospice services when the patient is unable to remain in their home. A \$5,000,000 capital campaign is underway to fully fund Joanne's House. Hope is already at 80% of the goal, and are seeking the remaining \$1,000,000.

Last Week: Koreshan History



Majorie Rubacky introduced substitute guest speaker, Doug Pratt. Doug is the Senior Pastor of First Presbyterian Church. Doug came to Bonita Springs two years after serving as pastor in Pennsylvania and Kansas. His hobbies are golf, literature, and bike riding. In addition, he is an "amateur historian".

Doug gave us a wonder-

ful background report on the Koreshan Unity colony that we all drive past frequently. These colonists were the first non-native settlers to come to the area in 1894. These pioneers wanted to build a utopian religious community and purchased about 1,000 acres of what is now Estero, Mound Key, and Estero Island. These courageous and resourceful folks carved out a self sustaining community with a saw mill, electric generator, printing press, homes, and a retail store in a hostile environment previously dominated by mosquitoes and alligators.

Cyrus Teed, the "dictator" and founder of the cult was a doctor from NY state. About 1870, he had some strange visions and revelations and began to recruit followers. He believed the universe was a concave ball and the world is on the inner surface. A model of this is on display at the site. He also believed the Bible was written in code and he alone had the key. Eventually he went to Chicago where he found support and established some communal houses. He claimed his mission was to take his people to the new Promised Land so he led them off to the "New Jerusalem" in the Estero swamp.

The community was noted for arts, plays and musicales performed. However, the cult did not reach out to other people and feuded with Lee County officials. The community began fading after Teed's death in 1908, and, in 1961, the last four members deeded the land to the state. Today, visitors can fish, picnic, boat, and hike where Teed's visionaries once carried out survey experiments to prove the horizon on the beaches of Lee County curves upward.

Vocational Minutes: Jim Horein



Jim Horein gave us a run-down on his careers. Always a Hoosier, at first, he pursued his dream by coaching basketball. He then returned to school studying computers and actuarial science. His second career was spent programming "big iron" IBM computers. This was back in the day of the punch card and big, raised floor computer rooms. His last career was in reinsurance where he became Director of International Reinsurance with world-wide responsibilities and travel.

He explained that reinsurance involves the transfer of insurance risk from the original underwriter to the reinsurance company. Among the reinsurance examples he gave were insuring a baseball team on flights, insuring Lee lococca's life while he was lead subject in Chrysler advertising, and insuring the risk of re-entering space craft pieces causing damage on the ground.

Now, Jim says his vocation is "managing my affairs". He summers in a rural location in northeastern Indiana with the largest buffalo herd east of the Rockies nearby.



Sheriff's Workload Continues to Grow

Last week Lee County Sheriff Mike Scott reported that the demand for services from his staff is expand-

ing with the community's growth, and that it had responded to more than 200,000 calls already this year.



He praised the cooperative arrangement with the City of Bonita Springs which pays for additional deputies above the normal "core service" level. This gives Bonita a full complement of officers that is, effectively, its "own police force" operating out of its own sub-station near the Community Hall.

He said that county plans to break ground this fall on a new 800-bed jail to relieve overcrowding among the inmate population which now exceeds 2,000.

School System Faces Major Challenges

Last week, Steven Teuber, Chairman of the Lee County Board of Education, gave us an upbeat report



on how our public school system is working to give our children "world class preparation to compete in a global society."

He explained that Lee County population is growing three times as fast as in the country as a whole, and that the school system must build 10 new schools every year to keep up with the growth and provide smaller classes for the 72,000 students He

praised the staff and teachers for the progress being made, but said we need to place more emphasis on math and science so that our country will remain competitive with China and India. These emerging countries are graduating many more engineers every year than is the U.S.

The school system must make changes "slowly and methodically" he said, to maintain the support and confidence of parents and the community. Teacher salaries are now competitive with our neighboring counties in Southwest Florida, but our entire state lags, now ranking 49th. To brings us up into the top half of states would require an additional investment of about one billion dollars annually.

Mr. Teuber, who has engineering, business and law degrees, had a successful career in industrial management before establishing his present legal practice in Cape Coral.

We Begin A New Rotary Year



We begin a new Rotary year today with a "Club Assembly", and welcome our new President Dick Fredrickson. Recently returned from the Rotary International Convention in Sweden and Denmark, he will review his personal goals for the club and lead a discussion of objectives for the new year.

Also, the Avenues of Service chairs will explain the various committees within each of those areas and the plans and objectives for each. These Avenues

of Service are Club Service, Community Service, International Service and Vocational Service.

Federal Reserve Work Explained

An area businessman who recently retired after three years as a member of the Board of the Miami Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, Joe Schwartzel gave us an interesting and informative presentation last week.

He explained that discount rate decisions are made by the Open Market Committee of the Fed. This committee is composed of the seven members of The Board of Governors plus five Presidents of Federal Reserve Banks. The head of the New York bank is a permanent member. The other four positions rotate.

Mr. Schwartzel, who owns and operates radio and television stations,

said that people like himself are selected for Fed Boards because of the input they can bring about business activity in a given area. This current information from the marketplace is considered along with statistical data compiled by economists as the Fed pursues its "critical balancing act" of controlling inflation and maintaining economic growth.

He said the Fed operation is a model for Central Bank operations around the world. It pays for its own cost of operation with fees it collects and interest on securities it holds to help control the money supply. Last year it returned \$24 billion to the U.S. Treasury.

Holly Hollingsworth Heads North

Rotarians were shocked and saddened last week when was announced that Rotary Director Holly Hollingsworth is retiring from her title insurance busi-

ness here and moving to Northeast

Georgia.



Holly has been a member of the Board of Directors for the past two years and has compiled an impressive record as public relations and publicity director for the club. Also, she has headed our Rotary Regulars activity and has developed close ties to the more than 50 seasonal residents who now consider this club their "Rotary home" during the winter.

At the recent Installation and Awards Dinner Holly, along with Bobbi Bird, was recognized as a "Woman of the Year". They were given Rotary necklace awards "for their hard work, enthusiasm and encouragement to others." In thanking her for her service to the club, Holly was given matching Rotary ear rings last week by President Gerry Myers and Director Nancy Ross.


Plans Outlined at Club Assembly

Escape to American Freedom Reviewed

Last week Nemo Malo, an area businessman whose family's escaped from communism in Albania to find success and happiness in Southwest Florida gave a heartwarming account of what American freedom has meant to him, and his pride in being an American.

One of the four brothers who own the Watermark Grille, a popular restaurant on US 41, just north of Immokalee Road, he reviewed the hardships the family has experienced. His father was a Freedom Fighter and his mother had been imprisoned in Albania. His father helped more than 200 people escape. After their own escape, the family lived in a refugee camp in Greece for six years, where his father began his life-long work with food.



They came to America through Ellis Island and settled first in New York, where they did menial work in restaurants. Later they operated restaurants in the Chicago area, and came to Florida 17 years ago. Today, seven of the eight children are in the food business, as are many of the 35 grandchildren. However, Nemo's daughter, who accompanied him, recently graduated from South Florida University and will be a

fifth grade teacher in Naples this fall.

Nemo said that his father who led the family here was unable to qualify for citizenship until he was 90,

and was thrilled when he was able to vote and proud to do so. He spoke emotionally about how important is freedom, and how few Americans exercise their privilege of voting.

He was introduced by program chair Bobbi Bird. She will be away with family in Maine for the next several weeks.

CFO, Arno DeVilliers, Architect, and Walt Nelson, President. Thermasteel is a pre-insulated light gauge steel framing material utilizing galvanized steel and Modified Expanded Polystyrene Resin (EPS). We were shown examples of uses in construction. The construction components are fabricated in the factory. It is an ideal material for use in Southwest Florida. It is highly resistant to mildew, resists fungus, decay and moisture gain. At a 7.5 inch thickness it has an R Value of 32. The materials are recyclable. Extensive strength/integrity tests have been conducted and it meets the Miami-Dade County hurricane resistance standards of up to 185 MPH winds. It is more fire resistant than wood construction. It stands up to termites, ants and other boring insects. It can be used in elaborate designs such as high-end Contemporary Mediterranean style residential construction. DeVilliers is in the using it in a home being built on the Haldeman Estate on Gulfshore Boulevard just south of the Naples Pier. The material has been used in construction in 27 countries on 60,000 projects over the past 25 years. It appears that the future in construction has arrived.



Bill Caputo introduced **John Pollock**, President of Oswald Trippe Co. who spoke about the state of the insurance industry in Florida. We learned



that the hurricanes, which hit Florida during the 14 months between August, 2004 and October, 2005 totaled \$30 Billion in damages in Florida. It will take the insurance industry 60 years to recoup the losses of that 14 month period. In setting rates the insurance companies must

look forward at the potential for loss. We learned that properties situated on the beach in our area can expect rate increases in the coming year of 200% to 350%., because of the risk of potential catastrophic storms. John stated that statisticians have calculated that if a storm with impact comparable to The Great Miami Hurricane of 1926 occurs in 2020 it would do \$500 Billion in damages. In order to mitigate the potential loss, older buildings must be brought up to today's hurricane resistant codes. John said that it will take a cooperative effort of the public, the construction industry, government and the insurance industry including reinsurance companies to help control insurance costs. We are be faced with higher premiums and larger deductibles.



Rotary Shelter Boxes Save Lives

Nearly half a million refugees from disasters have been

saved by Rotary shelter boxes in the past two years, Rotarian **Joe Peiser** told the club last week. He said 30,000 had been distributed in 34 countries to protect people who had been made homeless by the tsunami, earthquakes, floods and hurricanes.

Each shelter box is a self-contained unit which provides critical shelter and warmth for up to 10 people. It includes a 10-

person tent, 10 sleeping bags, water purification tanks and tablets, cooking and eating utensils, stove, flashlight and batteries, shortwave radio, tools, rain ponchos, etc.



It is the "Ritz Carlton," he said, for people who have nothing. Cost of a shelter box is \$900 including transportation. Several were contributed last year by members of our club, when the program housed 140,000 in Sri Lanka, 28,000 in Mississippi. 150.000 in Pakistan after the earthquake there.

Joe Peiser, who is a member the Lakewood Ranch

Rotary Club near Sarasota, represents ShelterBox USA. The program, which began in the UK, is also offered in Canada and Australia. Rotary organizations in other countries are expected



to join soon. He said equipment in the boxes continues to be improved, based on experience gained in the continuing series of world disasters.



The Y provides many low income families with scholarships for their children's swimming lessons. There was an average of 114 youth during each weekly summer camp in 2006. Child Watch is a program for parents, so their children can be supervised when they want to participate in exercise activities. A Tae Kwon Do program is offered with a theme of Discipline, Defense, Fitness and Fun. Project Graduation is a program offered on graduation night that helps new graduates have safe fun on their important night. Ryan pointed out that the Y works jointly with United Way of Lee County, the Literacy Council, Rosemary Park Soccer League, a Sunday afternoon soccer program for adult men, the Bonita Springs Charter School and the City of Bonita Springs. Ryan concluded his presentation by reading a letter from a woman who thanked the Y for the changes brought to her family in many ways especially in improving their health through fitness programs.


