

Our speaker on Wednesday was Theodore Brown is Professor Emeritus of Chemistry at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, and Founding Director Emeritus of the Arnold and Mabel Beckman Institute. Ted is deeply concerned about the prospects of global warming. He spoke about the trends in hurricanes driven by warm water. Hurricanes with pinhole eyes that concentrate damage and slower moving storms that linger and dump copious rain. He suggested that there are things we can do to mitigate the Red Tide. Keep the coastline as clean as possible, reduce nutrient levels flowing into the gulf, and clean up SWFL's water systems, agriculture, septic, golf courses.
